EDUCATION FEATURE:

SPARCC Program Launches 2025 Recruitment Cycle

The NIH-funded SPARCC (Student-Centered Pathway to Advance Research and Cancer Careers) program is now recruiting undergraduates for its 2025-26 cohort.

This 12-week hybrid educational initiative, spread out from November 2025 to August 2026, engages undergraduate students in faculty-mentored, hands-on summer cancer research, clinical practicums, and interactive workshops and journal clubs led by leading experts. Participants will gain a deep understanding of clinical and translational cancer research, benefit from professional networking opportunities, and receive guidance from leading experts to prepare them for careers in STEMM-related disciplines. A monetary stipend is provided to support scholars' research and learning efforts. There is no tuition fee, and housing support is available for scholars' residing outside the Milwaukee area during in-person sessions.

The SPARCC curriculum builds on the foundation of our previous five-year pathway program funded by the NCI (NCI-R25-CA 221715). From 2019 to 2023, we received applications from 29 states and the District of Columbia and successfully graduated 71 students. Many alumni have gone on to pursue graduate and medical education, enter STEM-related careers, or serve as Clinical Research Professionals.



NEW CLINICAL TRIALS:

- **PI: Elizabeth Hopp, MD — CORCEPT-**

CORT125134-557-BELLA: This phase III trial compares the effect of olaparib for one year versus two years, with or without bevacizumab, for the treatment of BRCA 1/2 mutated or homologous recombination deficient stage III or IV ovarian cancer. We would like to find out if taking olaparib as maintenance for one year is as good or worse than the usual approach of taking olaparib for two years for ovarian cancer patients.

- **PI: William Bradley, MD — NRG-GY036:** This

phase III trial compares the effect of olaparib for one year versus two years, with or without bevacizumab, for the treatment of BRCA 1/2 mutated or homologous recombination deficient stage III or IV ovarian cancer. We would like to find out if taking olaparib as maintenance for one year is as good or worse than the usual approach of taking olaparib for two years for ovarian cancer patients.

Creating cross-disciplinary teams for maternal health innovation


Fostering collaboration between clinicians, researchers, and community stakeholders.

STUDENT NEWS:

The OBGYN medical student clerkship has undergone several recent updates. In July 2025, Dr. Preerna Pandya and Jessica Grusnick assumed roles as clerkship director and co-director, supported by education coordinator Laura Kopacki. Drs. Mona Farez and Zachary Colvin provided guidance during the transition. The clerkship continues as part of the 12-week integrated surgical block in the Fusion curriculum, with the third rotation block now underway.

Resident involvement in student orientation and learning sessions has expanded. Dr. Mitch Depke led a patient-based session on postpartum hemorrhage, while Drs. Samantha Boettcher and Kathryn Tighe facilitated a Q&A session and helped teach vaginal delivery and prenatal exam skills during a clinical skills workshop.

This fall, twelve students applying to OBGYN residency were interviewed and supported with SLOE letters. To improve efficiency and quality, Dr. Vera Chen partnered with the clerkship team to develop an AI-assisted letter-writing process.

Finally, timely feedback and evaluation remain priorities. Faculty and residents are encouraged to provide students with real-time feedback on clinical skills, self-directed learning, and professionalism, and to complete OASIS evaluations promptly to ensure accurate grading.
